• Augustana has a new president! In September, Stephanie Herseth Sandlin was inaugurated as the 24th president (and first female president!) of Augustana. President

Herseth Sandlin follows former president Rob Oliver, who retired after 11 years of service at the helm of our Viking ship.

• We are growing! This year's class of 481 first-year students was the largest incoming class since 1978. These students come from 20 different states and 10 different countries. In addition, the overall student body increased 7.5% from last year to 2,080. This is the largest enrollment since 1990!

• Still going strong. According to the Student Success Center, 98% of the Class of 2016 graduates are employed in their major or chosen field. And in 2017, Augustana once again was ranked in Forbes' listing of America's Top Colleges.

• Way to give! Augustana's first ever Giving Day set a single-day record for the most gifts received in a 24-hour period, raising nearly \$136,000 for student scholarships. Alumni led the way in the giving; nice job, alumni! Please consider being part of Giving Day 2018 on Thursday, March 1.

• Boe Forum. Acclaimed astrophysicist Neil deGrasse Tyson drew nearly 4,000 people to campus for a wonderful lecture during the 2017 Boe Forum. This year's Boe Forum features former U.S. Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice. It will take place on March 20.

• Retirements. Three long-time faculty, Dr. Sandra Looney '62 (English), Dr. Peter Schotten (Political Science) and Dr. Duane Weisshaar (Chemistry) will retire at the end of this academic year. Watch for more details about how you can honor these Augustana teaching legends.
